## Next UCGS Gathering

February 21, 2009, Saturday morning at 9:30am at the Marysville Library

**Guest speaker: Scott Trostel speaking on THE LINCOLN FUNERAL TRAIN.**

Scott Trostel lives near Fletcher, in western Ohio. He has penned 38 history books. His genre includes transportation history books including railroad and electric railway biographies and one on Henry Ford as a railroad president, industrial histories including a snap shot of the Lima Locomotive Works and the Barney and Smith Car Company; WW II history (homefront) with a number of books about Ohio's WW II trackside canteens and a soon to be released book of letters from western Ohio soldiers as they described their experiences in WW II. Of current interest is **THE LINCOLN FUNERAL TRAIN**, a book that took 37 years to research and covers in detail, the 13 day funeral journey for Abraham Lincoln in 1865. This was the first national funeral for an assassinated United States President. Trostel's book is acclaimed as the most complete book ever produced on the topic of the national funeral. His talk will review the fascinating details of the train from April 21 through May 3, 1865 along the 1700 mile route. The train was co-chaired by Ohio Governor John Brough and it made two Ohio stops for State Funerals en route, at Cleveland and Columbus. The funeral train was local to the area in that it passed just east of Delaware on the morning of April 29, 1865. Trostel is a comfortable speaker and well worth the time to attend a talk as he is both entertaining and educational.

Trostel has dedicated three Ohio Historical Markers to the Lincoln Funeral Train in Ohio with others planned. He has dedicated a number of Ohio Historical markers along a range of Ohio historical topics. He recently worked with the History Channel on the production of their new documentary STEALING LINCOLN'S BODY and appears on-camera. He will have copies of his book **THE LINCOLN FUNERAL TRAIN** available for sale.

Minutes from the Union County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society  
January 17, 2009

The Union County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society met on Saturday, January 17 at 9:30 a.m. in the Marysville Public Library Meeting Room. Brian Wade called the meeting to order. Marie Bouic, recording secretary, read the minutes of the November 15 meeting. It was approved as read. Brian Wade gave the treasurer's report for Nina Boerger who was on vacation. Beginning balance for November 30 in the checking account was \$1,035.70. Income for December was \$586.36 and expenses for December were \$296.48 leaving a balance of \$1325.58 in the checking account. The balance in the savings was \$2921.80. The CD's had both added interest of \$163.54 leaving the CD's worth \$12,163.54. Total money in all accounts was \$16,410.92.

Standing Reports — Carol Mickley, Pioneer Chair, reported that 3 applications have been turned in to be reviewed. She is still looking for someone to serve on the committee. The Pioneer Banquet is set for May 16 with Ben Franklin as our speaker. She also suggested sending our meeting notices to Denise Birkhoff on the library staff so it will be announced in their newsletter and paper.

Nancy Katzenbach, librarian, reported that we had received the 3 volume set of GAR burials and passed them around to the group. Virginia Smith had indexed the Children's Home Records that were on microfilm in our drawers and they are now on our webpage.

Everyone introduced themselves and Brian started our program with a couple of incidents that Virginia Smith had sent him. He had an example of how names aren't always the same when for looking for proofs. On a marriage consent the name was Connor and on the actual marriage license it was O'Connor. The same is true for tombstones and he had an example where the dates were 100 years off.

Sarah Halley has been looking Christian Frederick Myer but could only find his wife buried in Kansas and his children just used their initials instead of full names. She also has the surname of Jones she is researching also.

Marie Bouic brought pictures of early Millcreek Twp. residents, Christian & Hannah Graham Myers along with a print out of their descendants that Margaret Bouic had compiled. Their daughter, Ann Catherine married John Henson Peter Bouic. Christian was an associate judge of the county and justice of the peace.

Vi Hill brought the newspaper articles of the Woodstock Universalist Church that have been in the paper recently. She shared a calendar of the church and windows that is for sale to help with the restoration of the church. She attended the church through high school. She shared some pictures of her ancestors and Civil War monument at the Woodstock Cemetery. Rush Twp. had the largest per capita number of men serving in the Civil War in the state.

Virginia Smith asked the group if they knew of anyone who can read German. On one of her collateral lines the name Kull but also found as Cool in a census record. She also shared of a triple murder case near Plain City in 1881. She has helped do research for Mark Star of California who is writing a book on early murders. A black man by the name of Robert Games was convicted of murdering the family. In 1907 he was the longest service prisoner in the State Penn. In 1914 he was pardoned on his death bed and moved to St. Ann's hospital where he soon died.

Nancy Katzenbach told how she and her husband were at the right spot at the right time reseaching the Maxey family in Kentucky. They were looking for a grave of an ancestor when they stopped at a church where two men were talking. They asked about the ancestor's family and they were the sons of the person they were looking for. They directed them to another brother who lived nearby and found the grave of the Maxey ancestor they were looking for.

Dale Neill shared a 1928-1929 booklet of the schools and teachers in Union County. His grandfather was listed as a bus driver in the Jerome District. Dale then shared and sang the song he recently wrote "The Covered Bridge Song" to the tune of "Wildwood Flower."

Calvin Wood is putting a book together about the covered bridges of the county of history, pictures and stories that he has received from people. Dale Neill gave him the words to his Covered Bridge song. Calvin shared a story that has been passed down from his family on a ancestor, Ruby Woods who married a Thomas O'Day an Irishman. He had found a book written by Robert Redford on the stories of the criminals of the west and shared a couple of paragraphs of the Sundance Kid, aka, Thomas O'Day. It still has not been proven that this is the same person who married his Ruby Woods.

Bob Hamilton shared the story of his 3<sup>rd</sup> gt. Grandfather Hamilton who came to Union County in 1838 and served as a commissioner in the 1840's. He had a family of 12 children and the 1883 Union County History has lot of information on his Hamilton's. His grandmother Robinson is a cousin to President Bush's mother, Barbara.

Carol Mickley told how she showed a distant cousins of her earliest Ohioan ancestor, Travis Latham burial site near the Muirfield Golf course. She passed a sheet of sources of information available in the library from a recent tour of the Courthouse.

Sharon Wade shared a story that had been published in the Delaware Gazette in December 1985 of her **P** gt. Grandfather, Anthony Newhouse and told the story how Bokes Creek was name after Leiutenant Bokes a friend of her grandfather's. Brian shared another story on the Newhouse family that had been published in the Journal Tribune and how J.E. Newhouse founded Magnetic Springs and the story of the healing waters. Sherrie Arnold was also attended the meeting.

Brian announced that we are still in need of a Newsletter Editor. The O.G.S. Annual Conference will be April 2-4 at the Sawmill Creek Resort in Huron, Ohio. The next meeting will be February 21 by Scott Trostel of Fletcher, Ohio on The Lincoln Funeral Train.

## THE FIRST FOUR DIVORCES IN UNION COUNTY

The following records have been abstracted from microfilm of the Supreme Court of Ohio for the County of Union. These four divorce cases seem to be the first ones to occur in the county. W. C. LAWRENCE acted as attorney for all of them.

### July Term, 1835

Sally RICE vs Ebenezer RICE

Judges: Joshua COLLETTS and Reuben WOOD

25<sup>th</sup> Apr, 1835 petition filed for Sally Rice: Petitioner testified that she, Sally Rice, married Ebenezer RICE in Coventry, Rhode Island, 1817. In June 1818, her son Gardner was born; her daughter Betsy was born in 1822. In 1823, Ebenezer left with all the family's substance and living to join a religious sect called Shakers. He has remained absent for 11 years. She asks the court to be released from the marriage, allowed the property she has accumulated since Ebenezer's departure and custody of the two children. Defendant failed to appear and plaintiff's petitions were granted July 1835.

### July Term, 1837

Jane GEER vs Joseph GEER

Judges: Rueben WOOD and Fredrick GRUIKEE

Petition filed for Jane GEER May 3, 1837: Jane married Joseph GEER in Union County in April, 1823. In about 1830, Joseph became intemperate with the use of ardent spirits and has neglected his family. For more than 3 years, he has been willfully absent. Rumors circulated that he had joined the Shakers in Cleveland for a short time, and possibly moved to Illinois. Three children of the marriage are: George, 9 years; William, 6 years; and Philander, 3 years. She asks to be released from the marriage and granted guardianship of the children.

Divorce granted July 1837

Justus M. HILL vs Mary Ann HILL

Petition filed for Justus M. HILL, May, 1837: Justus married Mary Ann ALLISON in June, 1830 in Delaware County, Ohio and moved to Union County that same year. Their three children: John, born 1831; Susannah, born 20 June, 1832; and Benjamin born Nov 12, 1833. About April 7, 1833, Mary Ann left the home and the two older children. The third child was born after she fled, but she returned the child to the home when passing through the neighborhood. She has committed adultery and has a name for lewd conduct. Justus HILL requests that marriage be dissolved.

Defendant failed to appear. Divorce granted July 1837.

Mary REED vs James REED

Mary REED testifies that she married James REED in Hardy County, Virginia in August, 1826. In the summer of 1832, James REED told her he planned to move to Union County, Ohio. He, James REED, employed Joseph Willis to bring her to this county and pretended to employ Joseph Fredrick', brother-in-law to the petitioner, to maintain her until he, James Reed should come to Ohio. Supposing the James REED to be in good faith with the petitioner, she came to Ohio with the said Willis, her father, and continued to live with the said Fredrick for one year. James REED promised to come to this county in 2 months after she departed in 1832. There are 2 living children: Sarah Elizabeth, 8 years old on Jan 16, 1837; and Josiah' 5 years on Feb 24, 1837. Mary besought and entreated James to come to this county as he proposed or provide a means for her to return to him. Since leaving Virginia, Mary Ann has supported the children unaided by James.

Divorce and guardianship of children granted.

<sup>1</sup> This record does not clearly describe the relationship of Mary Reed to Joseph Fredrick. Fredrick may be a surname, suggesting Mary had a sister who married a man named Fredrick.

### **Selected Abstracts from the Marvsville Tribune in 1878, from Volume 30**

*(From the works of Margaret Main Bouic)*

- March 19, 1879 p3c2 Obit. died at his residence, 3 miles north of marysville January 31 st, Mr. Joseph Dodds, aged 86 years, 9 months, two days. Mr. Dodds was a native of Washington county, Pa. His parents were Andrew and Mary Dodds. When Joseph was a child, the family moved to Erie county, Pa. For a few months he was enlisted and served as a soldier in the war against Great Britain. Upon his discharge, he and the family came to Ohio, and took up their residence in 1813 on the Darby. Here they resided two years, when they again settled on lands in Delaware county, on or near little Millcreek. Here Mr. Dodds was married to Miss Sarah Lawrence. she died Feb. 25, 1873. To them were born nine children, none of whom are now living and only three grandchildren survive. More than fifty years ago, Mr. Dodds united with the Presbyterian Church.

p3c2 John Phipps murdered by Ad. Elliott

- March 26, 1879 p2cl,2,3 Trial in Phipps murder

p3c1 Hiram Laughrey of Taylor township died on the 8th inst of lung fever, aged forty years.

W. H. Marriott who resided about four miles north of town died Wednesday. Sidle Cem
