# DEFUNCT ORGANIZATION

Dear folks,

Can you suggest how we can get word to the genealogical world that there has not been for the past half century a Ministerium of Pennsylvania Historical Society? Mail continues to arrive in great quantities addressed to the professor on our campus who attended to genealogical inquiries prior to his death in 1977. Yes, that is correct, not a typo!

When mail arrives on the campus it is directed to the library. In the Krauth Memorial Library of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia is a separate corporation, the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia. It serves Region 7 of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, covering approximately the eastern third of Pennsylvania and all U. S. locations east and north thereof.

This archival holding has limited church records of individual congregations, chiefly congregations which have ceased to exist. In Lutheranism, congregations retain their own records. For the records which are in the archives, almost none are indexed, therefore searching must be done by category of pastoral act, then searched chronologically.

I include all this information in the event that there is a place in your organization or in online genealogical services to note our limitations and thereby reduce the thousand or so inquiries a year which are outside the scope of our operations.

#### OPEN ALL DEATH RECORDS

The follow ing information was written and published in the Johnson County Daily Journal and reprinted in the Journal Gazette. 3 February 1997. (Sent to Ed. by Elaine Chapman from Antique Week)

If you want to research the medical history of your family and need death certificates in the State of Indiana. you might have to get a court order.

Although death certificates are public record in some counties. Hoosiers in other counties cannot access the information.

In Vermillion County. for example, death certificates are sent directly to the State Board of Health. When reporters from the Terre Haute Tribune Star wanted to examine death certificates of patients who died at a hospital that was under investigation, the newspaper had to file a lawsuit and justify its actions to a judge.

This shouldn't happen in a free and

open society, especially when other counties would allow immediate

Death records can be helpful to genealogists tracing family relationships. aid in medical research and often are the only source showing the cause of death. (Ed. note: This touches upon the problems that our speaker of Sept. 16, Mr. Ken Poling mentioned in his presentation.)

#### DESCRIPTION OF A TANYARD.

from the Haddonfield Historical Society Publications, No. 1. The Historical Society of Haddonfield. N. J. 1922.

Samuel Brown and wik. **Martha.** after living at the Tanyard several years, went to New York to live. first giving Thomas Redman power of attorney to sell their two-story brick messuage (a dwelling house with its outbuildings and adjoining lands). tanyard buildings. lot of ground. etc.. including the Iron Bark Mill. stone table for finishing leather. etc.. for not less than \$2200.

He sold the property to Thomas and Benjamin Borden. of Shrewsbury. N. J.

By that time it contained over six acres. The new surveyor did not mention the White Oak nor the land but. for the first time. --Tanners Street. (1826).

Bordens probably did not operate the tannery for they soon sold it to Samuel Allen. also of Shrewsbury. who was the ninth owner of the land in just a little over a hundred years. He made some improvements. the most permanent being the roughcasting of the house as it is at the present time. It is No. 38 Tanner Street.

Mr. J. Lewis Row and. to whom I am indebted for a description of the Tanyard says: We intended moving from Row and town (Westmont) March 25 (1843) but as the snow was so deep and the roads not broken we had to wait until April 1st. I was not quite seven years old, but from that time until I was twelve and started to go to school in Camden. I spent a great deal of my

time there. My father kept me busy Saturdays getting wheelbarrow loads of tanbark to put on our garden paths.

There' used to be a pond where Chestnut Street is. and the water ran from it into a ditch through the Tanyard property on its way to Hopkins Pond.

Along this ditch were large willows and under the largest one. measuring four or five feet in diameter and with limbs growing almost straight out from the trunk, was the pit in which the hides were placed. covered with lime. and left until the hair and surplus flesh and fat were loosened. A man wearing a leather apron that covered him from neck to feet would lift. with heavy iron hooks. a hide from the pit and place it on a rounded wooden block. two or three feet long, probably a piece of buttonw000d tree split in half. Then sitting on the ground he scraped. with an instrument like a carpenter's draw knife. all this hair and lime and flesh from the skin. It was a messy smelly

After this process the hides were ready to he tanned. But first the tan bark had to he ground.

As there is no hemlock near here. it was. no doubt. oak bark that was used. cut in the spring when the sap is beginning to run. It was brought in big wagons and unloaded at the barn which stood along the street. A bark mill like a huge coffee mill. ground the bark after it was broken into small pieces. by being held against the rim of the iron bowl of the mill and hit with a wooden mallet. A rod went up from the center of this bowl and an arm extended from that to which was hitched a horse who walked around the

The vats. in rows, were at the side of the house. near where Wilkins **Avenue** is now. They were about six feet deep and a little longer than a hide. lined with heavy planks. and one end partitioned off in such a manner as to allow the water to filter through into the small compartment. which held a pump. A hide was put in a vat and covered with tanbark. another hide and more bark until the vat was hill. and

then water from the well was pumped into it. The vats were connected by troughs; when the water in the last vat became dark it was pumped out into the ditch and water from the next vat was pumped in. and so on until the first vat was reached, then that was filled up with fresh water. When all the tanning qualities were out of the hark the vats were cleaned out and fresh bark put in.

Along the street was a worm fence. the hides were hung on that to dry. and in the workshop were marble tables on which they were finished. These tables have been cut up and made into tombstones. and are at ('olestown at the graves of Samuel Allen. Mary Allen. Mickle Clement and Mary W. Clement.

## MEDICAL TERMS FROM OTHER AGES—From an article by Myra Vanderpool Gormley, C. G., "Quacks. Cures, and Ancestors"

Ague-usually malaria. hut also applied to any fever with chills.

Chorea-(St. Vitus' Dance)-used to identity any nervous disorder.
Consumption-(phthisis Pulmonalia) a term for tuberculosis in the dm s when there was no effective treatment for it characterized by a gradual wasting aw ay of the body.

Dropsy-denoted any type of swelling. Inanition-most commonly signified the death of infants and the elderly from the inability to assimilate food. La Grippe-known today as the flu. Milksilk-not a disease, but a form of poisoning. Cows that ate the leaves of the white snakeroot plant passed along its toxin in their milk

's *Disease-the* degeneration of the vertebrae. often resulting in curvature of the spine.

Oumsy-an attack of tonsillitis resulting in abscessing near the tonsils. Septicemia-blood poisoning. Summer Complaint-highly infectious and a euphemism for dysentery. It earned its name from its frequent occurrence in summer.

Typhoid Fever-caused by unsanitary water and contaminated food or milk and carried by flies.

More definitions of medical terms

encountered in historical references can be found in genealogical dictionaries such as The New A to 'Lax by Barbara Jean Evans and 'that Did They Akan by That? by Paul Drake. Additionally . an article in National Genealogical Society Ouarterly (volume 76. number 4. December 1988) entitled Disease and Death in the Nineteenth Century: A Genealogical Perspective. by James Byars Carter, M. D. explains many old medical terms and provides information on their importance to genealogists. \*\*\*\*\*\*

**History** of Union Co.. OH.. 1883. Beers. Page 465

About 1850-52. Rev. George Harris organized a class at the schoolhouse. consisting of the following persons: Abraham Holy cross and wife I fester. William Holycross and wife Nancy. John Organ and wife Louisa. James Kennedy and wife Ivy. William I Holycross. Sr.. and wife Amy. Nancy (line, William Smith and wife Sarah. with Abraham Holycros<sup>s</sup> as class leader. Services were held at the schoolhouse about one year. when they erected a hew ed-log house for church purposes on the site of the present church. This house served them until 1870. when they erected the present frame building. at a cost of about \$1200. Sonic of the pastors have been Revs. George W. I larris. Samuel Brown. J. NI. Sullivan. Wesley Webster. Jonathan Verity. N. McDonald, W. N. Williams. D. II. Sargeant. F. McHugh, W. 13. Jackson. T. E. Fiddler. II. M. Curry. George W. Kelley. A. W. 13e11. J. F. 1.y d. George II. Kennedy. D. I.. Hay ward. and W. Q. Shannon. the present pastor in charge. The class leaders have been Abraham Holycross and W. H. Crary; the latter being in charge of the class at the present time. The church now has a membership of about seventy-five. During the summer a flourishing Sunday school is maintained with W. H. Crary as the last Superintendent. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*



The Gazette-Republican takes pleasure in presenting to its readers this week a good cut of the new Children's Home, now in the course of construction according to the plans of John C. Weidman, the architect from whose drawings the above cut was made. The building will cost close to \$10.000 and was ordered by the board of County Commissioners composed of Evan T. Jones, I. W. Cline and B. L. Robinson as it was an absolute necessity for the protection of Union county's wards.

The W. R. Weidman Co. Of Marysville have the contract and commenced laying brick on the new edifice Saturday. They will have the brick work done by the first of September. Their contract calls for the completion of the work by Dec. 1. The new edifice when completed will be 41 x63 feet, two stories high with basement under the entire building which will have a slate roof, yellow pine finish, bathrooms and closets, a large kitchen, fire proof furnace room and the entire building illuminated with acetyline lights.

The present trustees of the Children's Home are T. J. Williams, Richwood; Joseph Hawn, Darby township; George Rittenhouse, Dover township; and Dr. T. P. Shields, Watkins; all of whom were heartily in favor of building a new edifice as the old wooden one was un-

safe and unsanitary. At present there are sixteen children at the home but six more are expected by Supt. And Matron, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Fox, who kindly care for the children and teach them the way to live right and by all means have them secure an education.

A little over one year ago the Gazette-Republican advocated the building of this home for the little unfortunates of Union county and it is with much reluctance to the editors of the Gazette-Republican that the people of Union county took up the matter and urged the commissioners to make the appropriation necessary. It only goes to show the people of Union county are liberal in their views in this respect and want to see that their unfortunate children are well provided for.


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
