PUT ON YOUR COAT (OF ARMS) By Rebecca May Marion Star, Dec. 2, 1997

Think you have royal blood running through your veins? Maybe you're entitled to a coat of arms.

Arms first appeared in the late 1100s. Because armies of many knights were fighting for one king, they needed a bright symbol to distinguish who owned which soldiers. These knights also needed a seal for official documents. It seemed natural to select an easily recognized symbol to put on armor and on paper. Arms, then, quickly became known as a sign of nobility.

Arms are more than just a brightly-colored shield. The complete arms, also called the achievement, includes the helm (helmet), crest (small animal or bird statue on top of the knight's helmet when in the sun), motto and shield (main part of the arms). The shield gets the most attention since it displays the family symbol.

The top of the shield is the chief; the bottom is the base. The background is the field, and anything on the field is a charge. Plain geometic charges are called ordiniaries. Examples include a horizontal stripe (fess), vertical stripe (pale), diagonal stripe (bend), checkerboard (chequy) and inverted V (chevron). Other charges are chosen from nature: the lion (symbol of courage). unicorn (purity), phoenix (immortality), and sun (energy).

Many rules are involved when designing a coat of arms. Only five colors, called tinctures, are used: gules (red), azure (blue), sable (black) vert (green) and purpure (purple). Two metals are also used: or (gold), which is painted yellow,and argent (silver), which is painted white. Colors can't be next to colors, and the same goes for metals. Whew!

Arms can be used only by people who received them by a grant or through family descent.

Haynes place. The membership was small, and most prominent among the little band were Hiram and Lemuel Titsworth, John Johnson and Southworth Mather. The latter two were local preachers. Services were continued in a log schoolhouse until a new schoolhouse was built on the newly opened Marysville & Kenton road, which stood near the site of present Methodist Church, north of Byhalia.

Services were then held in the schoolhouse for a number of years. By the removal of members from the neighborhood, the society became very weak numerically and regular preaching was suspended.

About 1872, a class of the Methodist Episcopal Church, consisting of perhaps twelve members, was organized, with Allen Haines as class leader. The

society prospered, and in 1876 erected a commodious and handsomely constructed edifice, 34 X 48 feet, north of Byhalia half a mile, and close to the schoolhouse, in which the meetings had previously been conducted. Its cost exceeded \$2,000. It was dedicated by Rev. David Rutledge, then Presiding Elder of the district to which it was attached. The first steps looking to the erection of the church were taken during the pastorate of Rev. Solomon Linsley. His successors as pastors of this church have been Revs. William Shultz, William Dunlap, J. C. Clemmons, David Bowers and John W. Donnan. The last mentioned is now serving his second year. The Byhalia Church was originally included in the Mt. Victory• circuit, composed of four charges--Byhalia, Mt. Victory, Wilson Chapel and Reinhart Church, It is now an element in the York Center Circuit, which comprises four churches--McKendree at York Center, Byhalia, Summersville and Bethel. The present membership is about forty. A Sabbath school was organized subsequent to the erection of the church, and is now working in an active and successful manner. HOW BIG IS A CORPS?

Sometimes it is hard to understand the terms we find when we are researching our Civil War ancestors.

Here are a few of the military terms we often see: A company was about 100 men; a Regiment was about 10 companies: a Brigade was two or more regiments. A Corps was two or more divisions and an army was two or more Corps. When you see the word enlisment that is the date your soldier joined the State Regiment. The muster date is after training, the date the unit was accepted into Federal Service. Discharge means the date the soldier left the service while his regiment was still active. The muster out date is the time when the regiment was released from active service. (With thanks to the Delaware Genealogist)


