THE VICE-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Note: This is an election year for the UCCOGS and, as he has for the past several elections, Vice-President, **Calvin Wood**, is chairing a nominating committee of one. He is unable to find volunteers to help with the nominating process. This month he has taken over this space:

Sometimes, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for members of an organization to stand up and be counted. The Union County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society is no exception. We have a great organization going here and it is doing well in the community, not only because the officers and the committee members are doing their elected and appointed best, but also because some of our members are doing the jobs of two or three people. This is totally unacceptable.

A few weeks ago, President Gustafson and I had a conversation about this very subject. The point of this talk was she felt that she might not be well enough to run for another term. This is how close we came to not having a chapter at all. I will explain.

When there is no president, the vice president normally moves into that position. If President Gustafson could not run for another term *and no other member would take the nomination*; that would mean no president. In that case, the vice president would normally assume the duties until a president was elected. That was not going to happen! Counting my church, I volunteer in five other organizations. In some of those organizations, including my church, I hold more than one position, and cannot undertake additional duties.

Leona has since told me that circumstances have changed and if she is nominated she will run for another term. I feel the same way. I would stay and assist the president in any way I could.

Nominations are open for the five elected positions. These positions are not vacant, but if any person would like to nominate someone, or even nominate themselves, for the position of President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer or Corresponding Secretary, they are more than welcome to do so.

There here are also appointed positions that must be filled. These positions are: Membership Chairperson, Webmaster, Echoes Editor, Program Chairperson and, Lineage Society Chairperson. You do not have to wait until a member of the Executive Board approaches you

and asks if you will accept a position; you can come to us and tell us which one you want.

Tracing Your House's History



This is a program for anyone who has been curious about the past life of their home. Becky Hill, Librarian, Project Coordinator for the Hayes Presidential Center's Obituary Index, and genealogist will switch gears and explore the genealogy of a house. She will explain how to use printed and

online sources to track down the owners and history of a property through deeds, Sanborn Maps, city directories, tax records and other sources.

Ms. Hill has been Head Librarian at the Ruth-

erford B. Hayes Presidential Center since 1984 experiencing many of the massive changes that have occurred in libraries over that time - elimination of card catalogs, growth of web-based databases, digitization projects, use of internet for research, etc. She received her B.A. from Heidelberg College and her A.M. L. S. from University of Michigan and prior to HPC she worked in Tiffin Seneca Public Library and Erie County (NY) Community College. She currently gives monthly classes in genealogy at the Hayes Center which reflects President Hayes's own interest in family history. She created the Ohio Obituary Index which is a web-based partnership of 60 Ohio libraries which indexes 2.5 million names and is linked with Ancestry.com and Archives.com.

Burials in the Henderson Vault at Oakdale Cemetery, Marysville, Ohio

The impressive Henderson Family Vault at Oakdale Cemetery in Marysville, Ohio

The tomb was built in 1888 by two brothers, William Clay Henderson and Dr. David Watson Henderson. William Clay Henderson was a wealthy farmer and livestock dealer in Millcreek Township and Dr. David W. Henderson was a successful Marysville physician. Both of their fine homes still exist today.

There are three Henderson families buried in the Henderson Vault. The following is a list of their names as read from the crypt plates on May 24, 2013.

Crypt Plate No. 1

(John Henderson and Anne Jack were the parents of William Clay Henderson and Dr. David W. Henderson. According to the Record of Interments in Oak Dale Cemetery, Vol. 1, page 19, the bodies were removed [relocated] to the Henderson Vault at Oakdale for burial on Dec 13 1888.)

Records housed at the Union County Records Center and Archives:

NURSE RECORDS (1916-1956)

These records are arranged by date of filing and indexed by nurse. They contain copies of the nursing certificates of registered nurses who intended to practice nursing within the county. The records show certificate number, nurse, county of residence, date, name and location of degree-granting school of nursing, indicates date certificate issued with names of chairman and secretary-treasurer of the state nurses board signing the certificate, and also shows date certificate recorded in the probate court and the judge. On April 27, 1915, the Ohio General Assembly passed a law "to regulate the practice of nursing in the state of Ohio." This law required all individuals practicing as registered nurses, after January 1, 1916, to receive certification from a nurses' examination committee. The applicant was to present their diploma and to state the "actual time spent in the study of nursing." If their credentials were acceptable to the board, based on guidelines from the State Medical Board, they were granted a certificate to practice nursing. The individual was then required to file their certificate with the probate judge and this served as "conclusive evidence that its owner [was] entitled to practice nursing as a registered nurse" in the State of Ohio.

A TRIBUTE TO MARGARET ESTELLA (MAIN) BOUIC

(Dec 28, 1911 – Apr 3, 2012) By Rev. John Gray (Ret)

I once visited a faithful member of my church who had been ill for some years. Because of her long illness she had not been to church in many months. And I asked her: "Mary, is there anything I can take back to the church for you, is there something you would like me to tell your friends?" And Mary replied: "Yes, pastor, tell them I would like to be remembered."

I have been told that 'to be remembered' is to recognize that one is not remembered for what they received, but for what they gave. My cousin Margaret Bouic fits that proverb exquisitely well and deserves to be remembered by her friends and her peers in our wonderful hobby. There are countless numbers of us amateur researchers who have benefited from Margaret's generous sharing of her life-long work.

For those of us who like to browse through endless miles of microfilm and lug around musty old ledgers that make you sneeze every time you turn the page, it is gratifying to know that we do not labor alone in our hobby. Because of people like Margaret we know we are part of a very large family with a national reputation of being generous with one another.

By any standard, Margaret was extremely well suited for the task of the genealogist and local historian. Her collegiate background and professional experience as a teacher enabled her to not only produce large bodies of work, but to make sure they were documented and accurate, properly indexed and given a wide distribution. While most of us collect data in search of our ancestors, Margaret collected data for everybody's an-

cestors. And we need to remember also, that in the days before computers and copiers Margaret did it all on a manual typewriter with multiple pages of onion skin. How truly blessed we are today with word processing, scanners and copiers.

In the late 1970's, when I first started searching for my ancestors, Margaret and I discovered we had a double relationship. While we are related through the Graham/Gray family, her husband Fay and I connect through my maternal Lakin/Slyh/Walcutt family. It was while researching both sides of my family that I came into contact with Margaret who, in our very first meeting gave me copies of the old Lakin/Slyh family reunions from the late 1800's. Those papers were highly instrumental in helping me understand the composition and origins of the Lakin and Slyh families from Virginia to Ohio and even on back to Maryland and Pennsylvania. Since we were both charter members of the Union County Genealogical Society we had frequent opportunities to share our research.

On April 29, 2000 Margaret was honored by the Marysville Public Library, and in 2007 she was made a 'Fellow' of the Ohio Genealogical Society. Of all the people who have helped me put together my family genealogy, none were more valuable to me than Margaret. She was a teacher at heart and someone I am glad I got to meet and know.

Our Connections:

Margaret and I relate on my paternal line when two daughters of my great-great grandparents John Gray and his second wife **Julia Ann Sherman**, married Graham boys. Another Graham boy married into my Walcutt family, thus giving Margaret and I a triple connection.

Margaret's husband **Fay Lawrence Bouic** and I connect on my maternal line through the **Lakin-Slyh-Walcutt** family. Fay's great-grandparents were **Robert Bennett Hanson Bouic** who died in Middleton Valley, Maryland, and his widow, **Rebecca S. (Lakin) Bouic** who came to Ohio with her children just a couple of months after her husband's passing. Rebecca and her sons traveled west in a wagon train with my **Mathias Slyh** family.

In 1835 Rebecca purchased 231 acres of land in Millcreek Township, Union Co., OH, which property is still held by her descendants, making it the longest tenured land in my extended family anywhere, with the exception of the Bouic dairy farms in Middleton Valley, MD, which pre-exist even the Ohio farm.

Ground Penetrating Radar & Unmarked Graves

Dr. Jarrod Burks is a professional archaeologist who works for a private archaeology firm in Columbus, Ohio. Jarrod received his PhD and MA degrees in anthropology (archaeology) from The Ohio State University and his BA degree in anthropology from the University of Illinois at Urbana/Champaign. One of his great passions is relocating ancient earthwork sites through geophysical survey and to that end he has surveyed several dozen of these earthwork sites in Ohio, making numerous unique discoveries, including finding previously unknown earthwork sites. Jarrod is trustee of the Ohio Archaeological Council, a nonprofit organization of professional avocational archaeologists, and he is the Vice President and a founder of the Heartland Earthworks Conservancy (www.earthworksconservancy.org). ing his day job, Jarrod spends a lot of time in cemeteries attempting to locate unmarked graves. Such work has taken him to several interesting corners of the planet, including Guadalcanal and Poland.

Dr. Burks will be presenting on his work in running geophysical survey instruments (e.g., ground penetrating radar) to find unmarked graves in Ohio and many points beyond, such as Poland and Guadalcanal. His talk explores a little bit about how the instruments work and shows some examples from his research in Ohio archaeology.
